2. SAT of 430 or above, ACT of 13 or above, Maple TA of 7
c. SAT Math score of 650 or above (or an ACT Math score of 33 or above) or,
d. 23 out of 30 on the Quantitative Literacy Exemption Test

a. Four courses in high school in a single or multiple non-native languages, including American Sign Language, with a grade of C or better or,

d. Completion of English as a Second Language curriculum
