COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES: Art

ARTS 251 - Introduction to Computer Art

3 credits

An introductory course covering the fundamentals of computer art allowing students to explore a range of techniques using a variety of industry standard software for content creation. The latest developments in the field of computer art will be discussed. This course is structured to increase students' understanding of digital media in artistic production, to improve students' ability to create works using computers and their peripheral devices, and to discuss the ways contemporary artists use technology in art.

Note: Two studio contact hours are required for every credit hour.

Change title to:

ARTS 251 - Introduction to Digital Art

3 credits

An introductory course covering the fundamentals of computer art allowing students to explore a range of techniques using a variety of industry standard software for content creation. The latest developments in the field of computer art will be discussed. This course is structured to increase students' understanding of digital media in artistic production, to improve students' ability to create works using computers and their peripheral devices, and to discuss the ways contemporary artists use technology in art.

Note: Two studio contact hours are required for every credit hour.

ARTS 255 - Sculpture-Wood/Studio Furniture I

3 credits

An introduction to three-dimensional form, space, and content. Care and function of hand tools, machinery, and basic woodworking techniques, with emphasis on woods, adhesives, fabrication, and design of furniture and sculpture. Individualized projects stressed.

Prerequisites: ARTS 101, 102, and 104; or consent of instructor.

Note: Two studio contact hours are required for every credit hour.

ARTS 255 – Introduction to Sculpture-Wood

3 credits

An introduction to three-dimensional form, space, and content. Care and function of hand tools, machinery, and basic woodworking techniques, with emphasis on woods, adhesives, fabrication, and design of sculpture/furniture. Individualized projects stressed.

Note: May be repeated once for credit. Two studio contact hours are required for every credit

hour.

ARTS 336 - Intermediate Photography

3 credits

An investigation into photography as a method of exploring variations through digital imagery, darkroom manipulations, and alternative processes. Emphasis on quality print control and advanced camera use.

Note: May be repeated twice for credit.

Prerequisites: ARTS 215 and 245 or consent of instructor.

Note: May be repeated twice for credit.

Change note to:

ARTS 346 - Intermediate Sculpture

3 credits

Continuation of 245 with enriched theory and practice. Fundamentals and practice of construction, fabrication, assemblage with mixed media, and welded steel construction.

Prerequisites: ARTS 215 and 245 or consent of instructor.

Note: May be repeated once for credit.

A-F Grading

Effective term: Fall 2012

ARTS 351 - Intermediate Computer Art

3 credits

This course emphasizes time-based media. Students will develop motion graphic works using compositing, 2D digital animation, digital drawing/painting, and interactive sculpture/installation using various software and other physical materials/techniques while exploring intersections between digital and traditional studio practices. Contemporary theory examining the cultural impact and history of digital art will be discussed. The class will investigate narrative structures through experiments in linear and hypertextual navigation with the time-based and sequential capabilities of the computer.

Prerequisites: ARTS 251 or consent of instructor.

Change title, add repeatable to:

ARTS 351 - Intermediate Digital Art

3 credits

This course emphasizes time-based media. Students will develop motion graphic works using compositing, 2D digital animation, digital drawing/painting, and interactive sculpture/installation using various software and other physical materials/techniques while exploring intersections between digital and traditional studio practices. Contemporary theory examining the cultural impact and history of digital art will be discussed. The class will investigate narrative structures through experiments in linear and hypertextual navigation with the time-based and sequential capabilities of the computer.

ARTS 451 - Advanced Computer Art

3 credits

Continuation of 351 with emphasis on more advanced problems in time-based media works. Students will be encouraged to explore different techniques in digital art making including alternative interfaces and experiments with the computer, such as interactive installations with moving images and sound or mixed media projects. Considerable responsibility and autonomy required of each student.

Prerequisites: ARTS 351 or consent of instructor.

Note: May be repeated up to three times. *Change title, add repeatable to:*

ARTS 451 - Advanced Digital Art

3 credits

Continuation of 351 with emphasis on more advanced problems in time-based media works. Students will be encouraged to explore different techniques in digital art making including alternative interfaces and experiments with the computer, such as interactive installations with moving images and sound or mixed media projects. Considerable responsibility and autonomy required of each student.

Prerequisites: ARTS 351 or consent of instructor. **Repeatability:** May be repeated up to three times.

ARTS 455 - Sculpture - Wood/Studio Furniture IV

3 credits

Advanced exploration of sculptural concepts. Advanced techniques and methods in wood media designed to give the student maximum latitude and flexibility in individual expression.

Prerequisites: ARTS 357 or consent of instructor.

Change title, add repeatable to:

ARTS 455 - Advanced Sculpture - Wood

3 credits

Advanced exploration of sculptural concepts. Advanced techniques and methods in wood media designed to give the student maximum latitude and flexibility in individual expression.

Production and multiples in design are encouraged.

Prerequisites: ARTS 357 or consent of instructor.

Repeatability: Repeatable up to five times.

The Teachers of Tomorrow Advancing Learning Program affords strong academic preparation and immersion in school cultures through working with children having diverse needs in educational and community settings. Teacher candidates will graduate with a thorough understanding of best practices through early field experiences, an internship semester, and student teaching.

The student who desires to be a special education teacher for mild interventions must remain in good standing in the Teacher Education Program and complete the program outlined below which satisfies the requirements for the Bachelor of Science degree or the Bachelor of Arts degree, provided the foreign language requirement is fulfilled. The Special Education Program at Indiana State University requires students to complete professional education along with the General Education and additional subject matter requirements for the elementary education major. Satisfactory completion of the program makes the individual eligible for the Initial Practitioner License in the state of Indiana provided the individual satisfies the test requirements. Upon completion of this program, the holder can be licensed for mild intervention special education at all grade levels and for the general classroom in elementary, primary, and intermediate school settings.

A minimum grade point average of 2.5 is required with no grade less than C. Also see the General Education and additional subject matter and professional education for the elementary education major.
