FACULTY SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT FOR JANUARY 9, 2001

The Faculty Senate Executive Committee met at 3:15 p.m. in the Hulman Memorial Student Union (HMSU), Room 227.

Interim Provost Hopkins expressed President Benjamin's and his own appreciation for faculty involvement at the presidential inauguration and commencement and reported on the ongoing deans' searches in the School of Business and Education. He noted that overall enrollment is up 1% from Spring 2000.

Chair Bell also expressed his appreciation for faculty involvement at the presidential inauguration and commencement, especially to the many "backstage" faculty involved. He noted some needed updates to the information published in Spring Greetings 2001.

The Committee discussed President Benjamin's comments concerning the changing roles of full-time-regular and non-tenure-track faculty as reported in the STATESMAN in December, a reported improvement this semester in distribution of financial aid checks, the ongoing review of travel expenditures, and admission/retention standards.

The Committee continued editing the proposed Evaluating Teaching materials and approved edited versions of two items: a Resolution and a section headed "Examples" (8-0-0).

The Committee delayed consideration of a resolution from the Faculty Economic Benefits Committee until a representative of that committee could attend.
