FACULTY SENATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT FOR MARCH 20, 2001

The Faculty Senate Executive Committee met at 3:15 p.m. in the Hulman Memorial Student Union (HMSU), Room 227.

FACULTY GOVERNMENT – Faculty Senate Executive Committee Report: continued

Representatives of the academic units certified ballots and totals for Faculty Senate seats.

President Benjamin expressed his appreciation to Coach Waltman and the members of the men's basketball team, and for the support of so many individuals and organizations during the NCAA tournament. He noted that the team and its members enhance the image of the University.

The president reported on his recent trips to establish alumni chapters, on meetings with legislators concerning budget challenges, on development of property north of the campus, and on the recent failed search for an internal auditor. Further addressing budgetary concerns, he noted that 83% of ISU graduates stay in Indiana, which contributes to a positive image for ISU with state legislators.

Interim Provost Hopkins updated the Committee on the search for a dean in the School of Business and on continuing discussions with Ivy Tech regarding transferability of coursework.

The Committee heard a presentation on a proposed ISU Intranet, and discussed continuing concerns about the academic calendar and salary compression.

After extended discussion the Committee tabled (for revision) FAC recommendations concerning pro-rated compensation for under-enrolled summer school courses.

The Committee approved an amended version of the General Education Locus of Control document and a minor editorial revision in the School of Nursing Statutes.
