#### **Executive Summary:**

During the 2000-01 academic year the Department underwent the first two phases of a major structural revision, the first of which was to incorporate the faculty and course work in Linguistics/TESL and English as a Second Language into the Department. The second phase completed last year was the consolidation of its major and minor degree programs in French, German, Latin, Linguistics/TESL and Spanish into one unified Major in Languages, Literatures, & Linguistics (40 semester hours) and one unified Minor in Languages, Literatures, & Linguistics (24 semester hours).

This year the Department is undertaking the third step in its evolution, namely to put curricular form and substance to its newly unified major and minor, allowing students and faculty to share resources across disciplines. As a result of these proposed changes, the Major in Languages, Literatures, & Linguistics will decrease to 39 credit hours, and the Minor in Languages, Literatures, & Linguistics will remain at 24 credit hours. Majors and minors will take a common core of 3 hours regardless of their area of language study (Majors will take an additional 3 hours). A cross-linguistic option will also be available, allowing for students to incorporate knowledge of multiple languages into their major. As part of the unification, all language areas will align their requirements and course numbers so that students in each language will take similar courses in the same sequence. The Concentration in International Studies, as a separate area, will no longer be offered. The high number of course changes reflect the fact that the Department offers instruction in at least seven

different linguistic areas as well as the fact that there has been a severe lack of common structure and sequencing across the curriculum. This revision to a curriculum with a unified structure allows students to combine studies beyond the bounds of a single language area, which will give them a greater range of career options.

#### **Rationale:**

The Department currently teaches the basic concepts of language study in separate course work within each area. Teaching all students together in core courses will ensure that students receive the same background regardless of language background or preparation, at the same time interacting with and learning from students from other language areas. The new structure will also allow students the flexibility to complete a traditional concentration in one language or to engage in cross-linguistic study, thus enhancing their marketability given today's employment environment. In addition, it will allow for more efficient use of faculty, whereby faculty from a single language area could have instructional contact with any student in the program.

The major area "Foreign Language Major with a Concentration in International Studies" (which was essentially the LLL major plus the equivalent of an additional minor in approved international studies courses) is being deleted for two reasons. First, only three students have graduated in this major area since 1992. Second, there is now a viable external minor available which essentially offers the same options to LLL majors, i.e., the interdisciplinary International Studies minor housed within the College of Arts and Sciences and administered currently through the International Affairs Center.

*Electives (58 hours)*: (1) In the Department of Languages, Literatures, and Linguistics: 34 hours in primary language on the 300-400 level with the advisor's approval; (2) 15 hours distributed as follows: 3 hours in geography/geology; 6 in history; and 6 hours in political science selected by the student with the advisor's approval; (3) 9 hours from courses, with

the advisor's approval, offered by the Departments of African and African American Studies; Economics; Languages, Literatures, and Linguistics (in a language other than the student's primary area); Geography, Geology, and Anthropology; History; Humanities; and Political Science.

*Required Courses in Spanish (14 hours)*: 201--3 hrs.; 202--3 hrs.; 311--3 hrs.; 312--3 hrs.; 322--2 hrs.

#### **TEACHING CURRICULA**

## Major in Languages, Literatures, and Linguistics, Senior High-Junior High/Middle School Teaching License (40 semester hours)

This major may be added to the Senior High-Junior High/Middle School Instructional License, the coverage of which is grades 5-12.

Majors with fewer than two years in a non-native language during their secondary education are required to take 46 hours. In addition Foreign Languages 390 is required. Courses 101 and 102 or equivalent are prerequisites for 201.

*Required Courses in French or German*: 201--3 hrs.; 202--3 hrs. in the primary language.\* *Electives*: 34 hours in the primary language, 30 of which must be on the 300-400 level, with the advisor's approval.

*Required Courses in Spanish*: 201--3 hrs.; 202--3 hrs.; 311--3 hrs.; 312 --3 hrs.; 322 --2 hrs.\* *Electives*: 26 hours in Spanish at the 200, 300, and 400 levels with the advisor's approval.

The 40 semester hours must include course work in the following areas: Language: minimum **6** hours; Literature (French, German, Spanish): minimum of 6 hours; Culture and

Civilization (French, German, Spanish): minimum of 4 hours. Specific courses for meeting **h** requirements and for the remaining hours in directed electives are to be selected in consultation with the advisor.

\**Required Professional Education*: Foreign Language 390--2 hrs. is required in the Senior High-Junior High-Middle School Professional Education sequence described in the Department of Curriculum, Instruction, and Media Technology.

#### Minor in Languages, Literatures, and Linguistics (24 semester hours)

This minor may be added to the Senior High-Junior High/Middle School or All Grade Instructional License, the coverage of which is grades 5-12.

Minors with fewer than two years in a non-native language during their secondary education are required to take 30 hours. In addition Foreign Languages 390 or Latin 390 (for Latin students) is required. Courses 101 and 102 or equivalent are prerequisites for 201.

Required language courses in all areas: 201--3 hrs.; 202--3 hrs. in one language.\*

*Electives*: 18 hours in the minor area with the advisor's approval. Students selecting a primary area in French, German, Latin, or Spanish must take 14 hours of these electives at the 300-400 level. Those with a primary area in Linguistics/TESL may include French 303, 404, or 492; Spanish 402 or 404, or Latin 401.

The 24 semester hours for those with an area in French, German, Latin or Spanish must include

# Minor in Department of Languages, Literatures, and Linguistics, Elementary Teacher License (24 semester hours)

This minor may be added to the Elementary Instructional License; its coverage is grades 1-6. Minors with fewer than two years in a non-native language during their secondary education are required to take 30 hours. In addition Foreign Languages 390 or Latin 390 (for Latin students) is required. Courses 101 and 102 or equivalent are prerequisites for 201.

*Required language courses in all areas*: 201--3 hrs.; 202--3 hrs. in one language.\* *Electives*: 18 hours in the primary area with the advisor's approval. Students selecting a primary area in French, German, Latin, or Spanish must take 14 hours of these electives at the 300-400 level.
Those with a primary area in Linguistics/TESL may include French 303, Spanish 402 or 404, or Latin 401.

Required and elective courses in the areas of French, German, Latin, or Spanish must include 6 hours in basic communication skills and 4 hours in the history, culture, and lifestyle of the language area. Specific courses for meeting the requirements and for the remaining hours in directed electives are to be selected in consultation with the advisor.

\**Required Professional Education*: Foreign Language 390--2 hrs. is required in the Senior High-Junior High-Middle School Professional Education sequence described in the Department of Curriculum, Instruction, and Media Technology.

#### Language for Junior High/Middle School License (20 semester hours)

The supporting area may be taken as a component of the Junior High/Middle School endorsement for elementary education teachers. A general description of the Junior High/Middle School endorsement appears under the Department of Elementary and Early Childhood Education sections found elsewhere in this *Catalog*.

Supporting Area: Basic communication skills: minimum of 6 hours. History, culture, and lifestyle:

minimum of 4 hours. Electives: 10 hours. Specific courses for meeting the requirements and for the remaining hours in directed electives are to be selected in consultation with the advisor in the Department of Languages, Literatures, and Linguistics.

#### Teaching English as a Second Language Licensure (24 semester hours)

Coverage is K-12.

#### Language Specialist Honors Certificate

Students earning the Bachelor of Arts in Languages, Literatures, and Linguistics with the single language option may receive the Language Specialist Honors Certificate by fulfilling the following two requirements:

- 1) Successful completion of an appropriate study abroad experience of at least 5 weeks in duration or equivalent approved experience.
- 2) (a) Maintenance of a minimum grade point average of 3.5 in all course work applied to the major *or* (*b*) Completion of a nationally-recognized language exam in the primary area (e.g. **a** of those administered by the Goethe Institute in German or the American Association of Teachersof Spanish in Spanish) with a level of performance to be specified by the Department.

#### COLLEGE OF ARTS & SCIENCES: Psychology B.S./B.A. Psychology

#### **Executive Summary:**

This program modification will reduce the credit hours required in the program by one hour and will modify the core course requirements and alter the categorical course structure. It should have no affect on General Education courses, the teaching curriculum or requirements in other programs.

The general psychology program has been designed to provide students with a broad background in core areas of psychology. We encourage students to plan an individualized program of study in keeping with his or her academic and career interests. To summarize the proposed changes in the Psychology Major, we plan to eliminate Psychology 376, Statistics and Research Methodology II (4 hours) from major requirements. Instead, we propose to change the title to Advanced Research Methods, and reduce the class to 3 hours credit as an elective choice. We plan to eliminate the distinction between "Experimental" and "Personality" course requirements and instead require students to complete 5 courses from a selected list of core areas of study within psychology. Those core courses will be Psychology 266 Developmental Psychology (3 hours), 270 Social Psychology (3 hours), 310 Learning (3 hours), 342 Perception (3 hours), 344 Cognitive Psychology (3 hours), 356 Physiological Psychology (3 hours), 362 Psychology of Personality (3 hours), 368 Abnormal Psychology (3 hours). Directed electives will be increased from 6 hours to 9 hours (or 6 hours along with Psychology 384 if 484 is chosen as the culminating experience). The overall semester hours for the psychology major will be reduced from 38 to 37 hours. In addition, we would like to rename the titles of Psychology 201 from Fundamentals of Psychological Research to Introduction to Research Methods in Psychology and Psychology 375, from Statistics and Research Methodology I to Statistics in Psychology. The course description for Psychology 375 also will be altered to better reflect how the class has been structured in recent years. We would also like to unbank Psychology 455 Animal Behavior (3 hours) so that it may be offered as one of our electives.

No other requirements will be changed. That is, we will continue to require 101 General Psychology: Understanding Human Behavior (3 hours), 201 Fundamentals of Psychological Science\* (3 hours), 375 Statistics and Research Methodology I\* (4 hours), and either 484 Field Work in Psychology (3 hours) or 486 Research in Psychology (3 hours). Psychology 384 Survey of Psychological Applications (3 hours) will continue to be a prerequisite for 484.

\*Titles of these courses will be changed.

#### **Rationale:**

We believe that the proposed changes will enhance the department's ability to offer students the necessary classes at optimal times. We have several fewer faculty to teach classes than when this curriculum was first adopted and we have considerably more psychology majors, which often presses the faculty to teach overloads, teach classes that are quite large by ISU standards, and add classes after the schedule has been published. To accommodate students' needs. We also believe that this change will give students additional flexibility to take classes that match their career goals UNDERGRADUATE PROPOSALS – Program Revisions – Psychology – B.A/B.S.: continued

and interests. We recommend that students interested in specialized preparation for graduate training in psychology take Psychology 376 as well as a combination of 497, 498, and/or 499 as suited to their individual needs. We believe these changes make our program more similar to other psychology programs offered nationwide.
