Summary and Rationale:

This program is being proposed for elimination. The department has stopped offering the program and stopped admitting new students to the program in 2004. If the program is able to be revived again, it will be done as a specialization under a CACREP approved program.

Old Catalog Copy:

Master of Science--Marriage and Family Therapy (60 semester hours)

The master's degree program in marriage and family therapy is designed to provide professional training for persons seeking positions in settings such as family service agencies, medical facilities, mental health centers, private practice, religious organizations, or correctional institutions. This program is also for inservice training for personnel who already hold positions in such areas as mental health, social work, school counseling, and agencies serving couples and families. A corollary purpose is to provide a foundation for advanced work in the counseling field.

This program follows the contemporary guidelines set forth by the national accrediting body for the field of marriage and family therapy, American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy, and is accredited by this body through the year 2006. This program also follows the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Counseling Related Educational Programs (CACREP) standards, the national accrediting body for programs in counseling including marriage and family therapy.

Admission Requirements

Each applicant must satisfy the general criteria for admission to the School of Graduate Studies and each of the following requirements:

- 1. Have at least 12 semester hours in the behavioral sciences at the undergraduate level (e.g., psychology, sociology, and anthropology).
- 2. Have an overall undergraduate grade point average equal to or above 2.75 on a 4.00 point scale. For students with a grade point average below 2.75 on a 4.00 point scale, special attention is given to their final 60 credit hours.

3. Have scores on the General Tests of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE), or Miller Analogies Test (MAT). While the GRE and MAT standardized scores are used in conjunction with other admissions criteria, typically, scores near or above 450 on each section of the GRE, and MAT scores of 45 or above receive a more favorable review.

Theoretical Foundations of Marital and Family Therapy (6 hours): Counseling 536--3 hrs.; 550--3 hrs.; Assessment and Treatment in Marital and Family Therapy (15 hours): Counseling 615--3 hrs.; 595S--3 hrs.; 628--3 hrs.; 646--3 hrs.; 650--3 hrs.

Human Development and Family Studies (12 hours): Counseling 666--3 hrs.; Educational Psychology 621 or Psychology 566--3 hrs.; Psychology 568--3 hrs.; Sociology 560--3 hrs.

Ethics and Professional Studies (3 hours): Counseling 738M--3 hrs.

Research (3 hours): Counseling 620 or Educational Psychology 620--3 hrs.

Supervised Clinical Practice (15 hours): 739M--3 hrs. (taken three times); 838M--3 hrs. (taken twice). *Other* (6 hours): Counseling 533--3 hrs.; 635--3 hrs.

Culminating Experience: Complete Clinical Comprehensive Examination during the final enrollment of Counseling 739M.

In addition to the 60 semester hours of course work, the student must acquire a minimum of 500 hours of direct-client-contact therapy. At least half of the aforementioned 500 direct client therapy hours must be relational. The student must also acquire 100 hours of faculty supervision of which not more than 50 hours may be group supervision.

FCS 448 Human Development and Family Studies Practicum--3 hours. Students will participate in a supervised experience in the human and family studies profession. Open to Human Development and Family Studies majors only. Pre-requisites: FCS 301 and FCS 336

Preferred Effective Term: Fall 2006

COURSE REVISIONS

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES: Family and Consumer Sciences

FCS 436 Child and Family--3 hours. Study of development and behavior of five-12 year olds.

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Family influences, child-rearing, and interpersonal relationship will be considered, based on research findings. Prerequisite: FCS 109, or Educational Psychology 202 and Sociology 280, or consent of instructor.

Change description, title, and prerequisites to:

UNDERGRADUATE APPROVALS: FCS 436 - Continued.

FCS 436 Parent Education--3 hours. This course investigates the various means and methods in assisting parents to teach, guide, and influence their children and adolescents. Variations in parenting practices, exploration of parenting as a process, knowledge of parental rights and responsibilities, and examination of parental roles throughout the life cycle will be explored. Prerequisite: FCS 237 and FCS 238.

Preferred Effective Term: Fall 2006

FCS 437 Infant Development--3 hours. Development from conception through the second year, as influenced by family experiences; observation of and participation with infants are required. Prerequisite: Psychology 101 or consent of instructor.

Change description, title, number, and prerequisites to:

FCS 237 Child Development -- 3 hours. This course provides a thorough examination of physical, cognitive, emotional, and social development from conception through age twelve, as well as the influence of ecological experiences. Observation of and participation with infants and children is required. Prerequisite: FCS 109

Preferred Effective Term: Fall 2006

FCS 438 Child Development--3 hours. Development of the young child as influenced by the home and family environment; observation and participation in parent nursery required. Prerequisite: Psychology 101 or consent of instructor.

Change description, title, number, and prerequisites to:

FCS 238 Adolescent Development -- 3 hours. This course examines the physical, cognitive, emotional, and social development of individuals from puberty through adolescence as well as the influence of ecological experiences. Observation of and participation with adolescent is required. Prerequisite: FCS 109

Preferred Effective Term: Fall 2006

FCS 440 Family Life Education in School and Community--2 hours. Development and behavior of adults as influenced by home and family environment. Prerequisites: 336 or equivalent and 438, or Educational Psychology 342, or consent of instructor.

Change number and prerequisites to:

FCS 140 Family Life Education in School and Community--2 hours. Orientation to the field of human services via speakers currently working in local and state child and family service agencies.

Preferred Effective Term: Fall 2006

FCS 441 Family Life Education--3 hours. Current research and theoretical foundations of family life education, methods of teaching, personal adjustment, dating marriage, family

relationships. Prerequisite: 336 or consent of instructor.

Change description, title, and prerequisites to:

FCS 441 Family Life Education Methods -- 3 hours. The general philosophy and principles of family life education across the lifespan will be considered as groundwork for planning, implementing, and evaluating programs. Prerequisite: FCS 436.

Preferred Effective Term: Fall 2006

FCS 449 Practicum in Child Development and Family Life--1-6 hours. Guided experiences in a nursery school, day care program, youth club or family service program. Prerequisite: consent of instructor.

FCS 449 Internship in Human Development and Family Studies--3 hours. Supervised experience with an agency or organization that provides support and/or education for children, youth, and/or families. Prerequisites: Open to Human Development and Family Studies majors only. Prerequisite: FCS 448.
