COLLEGE OF HEALTH AND HUMAN PERFORMANCE: Recreation and Sport Management

RCSM 231 Management Theory in Recreation and Sport Management I--3 hours. Foundations of management as they relate to recreation and sport related agencies. This course includes

organizational structure and theory, strategic planning, comprehensive planning, political and community organizations and their impact on the delivery of recreation and sport services.

Preferred Effective Term: Spring 2007

RCSM 331 Management Theory in Recreation and Sport Management II--3 hours. Advance principles and methods of administration and management as they relate to leisure and sport related services in the public, private, voluntary, and business sectors. The course will complement 231, Management Theory in Recreation and Sport Management I, by building on administration and management concepts and methods already introduced, plus explore additional material in the following areas: human resources, public relations, ethics, management by objectives, marketing, program evaluation, research, data analysis, and data reporting.

Eliminate Old Title: Driver Education Endorsement – Major Code A227 Change to: Driver Education License

Executive Summary:

The Indiana Department of Education and Professional Standards Board approved a new Driver Education License to replace the Driver Education Endorsement. The change included reducing the initial hours from 12 to 9 and requiring continuing education for license renewal. The criteria will continue to be aligned with the American Driver and Traffic Safety Education Association's

National Standards recommendation for Driver Education Instructor Preparation. Indiana State University is currently using materials from this program in its instructor preparation program. The purpose of the proposal is to bring the practice in line with the changes at the state level.

Rationale:

The Indiana Department of Education and the Indiana Professional Standards Board have established new standards that have three parts, knowledge, performance and disposition. The changes in the courses that are being recommended reflect the changes in the standards prescribed by the Professional Standards Board. With the requirement of continuing education the instructors will be encouraged to improve or voluntarily leave the program. This revision continues to keep Indiana State University as a leader in the state and nation in driver education instructor preparation. *CATALOG COMPARISION*
