Quantitative Literacy Requirement Change - Revision

Students may satisfy the Quantitative Literacy requirement by obtaining a passing score on the Quantitative Literacy Exemption Test or by earning a passing grade in one of the following courses: Mathematics 102, Mathematics 115 or a higher-numbered mathematics course (except Mathematics 205 or Mathematics 305), or a college-level statistics course. A college level statistics course is defined as a course that includes as a prerequisite either Mathematics 111 (or a higher-level/higher-numbered mathematics course) or a placement examination result indicating an equivalent background in mathematics. As of the current date, statistics courses that meet the Quantitative Literacy requirement are: Business 205, Business 305, Economics 370, Life Sciences 485, Mathematics 241, Mathematics 341, Mathematics 442, and Operations Management and Analysis 405. Any other statistics course will satisfy this requirement if it requires one of the preceding statistics courses or Mathematics 111 (or higher) as a prerequisite and the department provides a course syllabus and official documentation of the change to the General Education Office. In addition, college algebra courses that transfer to ISU as Mathematics 018 will satisfy the Quantitative Literacy requirement. This revision of the Quantitative Literacy requirement is effective immediately.
