## **DEPARTMENT NAME CHANGE APPROVAL**

### **COLLEGE OF EDUCATION**

A Proposal to Reorganize the Departments of Communication Disorders, Counseling, and Educational and School Psychology under a new name was approved by the Teacher Education Committee on April 18, 2006, and the Curriculum and Academic Affairs Committee. This proposal will be presented to the Executive Committee of the Faculty Senate in early Fall 2006.

The Departments of Communication Disorders, Counseling, and Educational and School Psychology have a long history in the College of Education. All three areas of study have strong ties to education, health and human services, and rehabilitation. Various programs within the current departments have a direct link to the process of education and are involved in the direct education of school personnel. In addition, there are direct connections to formal teacher preparation. Finally, all three departments offer practice-based training.

service delivery, and outreach. While these areas vary in their relationship with each other, they have a consistent association with education.

This proposal evolved out of a desire to increase educational effectiveness due to changes in the academic environment. It is a continuation of the reorganization within the College that is based on current academic similarity, with regard to education processes, rather than historical perceptions. The education, training, and rehabilitation activities of these three departments outside the traditional K-12 or K-20 system have numerous similarities, and a reorganized department would allow faculty to take advantage of those similarities.

Courses and programs will remain the same.

**On September 22, 2006 Board of Trustees approved this merger under the name of Department of Communication Disorders and Counseling, School, and Educational Psychology (CDCSEP), effective October 1, 2006.**

**COLLEGE OF BUSINESS: Organizational Department**

**Motorsport Management Minor (21 semester hours)**

**Executive Summary:**

This is a new collaborative minor program that utilizes courses from four departments in three colleges. It addresses the state's goals of supporting Indiana's motorsports industry. It enhances our students' opportunities for employment in a growing industry. It builds upon a core with coursework in three areas, then provides concentrations using electives from different departments. The 12-hour core includes coursework from business, industrial and mechanical technology, and recreation sport management. Each student will take nine hours of electives from any area. Students do not need to major in one of these three areas.

## **Rationale:**

For nearly a year, a large group of practitioners from the motorsports industry has been brought together to discuss how Indiana State University could contribute to the state's motorsports initiative. It was recognized by the group that there is a large contingency of our current and prospective students who would be attracted to the motorsports industry. The governor of Indiana has established an industry task force whose mission is to stimulate growth in the motorsports industry via economic and other incentives. The ISU study group identified numerous potential contributions in three areas: economic research, direct training of industry practitioners, and curriculum development. This minor addresses the third directive and opens the door for the second directive of direct training for the industry.

One dean and a contributing faculty member traveled to the United Kingdom to attend a motorsport conference; a contributing faculty member also participated in the International Motorsports Education Forum in December 2005. Feedback from the motorsports industry has indicated strong support.

The program makes use of existing courses for electives and three of the four electives. One existing elective course is being transformed for this minor program. No new faculty are necessary for this minor. Contributing faculty:

## **Description of Program**

### **Motorsport Management Minor (21 semester hours)**

The Motorsports Management minor is open to all majors who wish to enter the motorsports industry. It is structured to minimize pre-requisites and maximize flexibility, while giving a foundation of core skills useful in the motorsports industry. The creation of this minor is a joint effort of the College of Business, College of Technology, and College of Health and Human Performance. The motorsports industry is understood to encompass designing, building, maintaining, managing, and promoting motorized vehicles intended for competition. It is also understood to encompass the creation, financing, managing, and promoting of facilities, products and services designed to support competition for motorized vehicles.

#### ***Motorsport Management Minor (21 semester hours)***

The Motorsport Management minor is open to all majors. It is structured to minimize pre-requisites and maximize flexibility, while giving a foundation of core skills useful in the motorsports industry. The motorsports industry includes designing, building, maintaining, managing, and promoting motorized vehicles intended for competition. It also includes the creation, financing, managing, and promoting of facilities, products and services designed to support competition for motorized vehicles.

**Required:** Insurance 340—3 hrs.; Industrial and Mechanical Technology 132—3 hrs.; Recreation and Sport Management 330—3 hrs. or Industrial and Mechanical Technology 330—3 hrs., 420—3 hrs.
