COURSE REVISIONS

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES: Music

MUS 169C-369C Concert Band—0-1 hour. Study and performance of standard literature as well as training in ensemble playing. Open to all wind and percussion instrument players. Three class hours a week.

MUS 169C-369C Concert Band—0-1 hour. Study and performance of standard literature as well as training in ensemble playing. Open to all wind and percussion instrument players. Three class hours a week. Repeatable.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION: Elementary, Early, and Special Education

SPED 320 Instructional Principles—3 hours. This course describes the way schools format individual educational plans for students who have been identified as having a disability and who need special education. Individualization is described following research-based approaches. Prerequisites: 215, BCP-I, and Elementary Education Block II.

Change description to:

SPED 320 Instructional Principles—3 hours. This course describes procedural requirements mandated by current legislation for determining a child's eligibility for special education and development of an Individual Education Program for a qualifying child. The legal foundations of special education are addressed as background for current legal requirements. Prerequisites: 215, BCP-I, and Elementary

NEW COURSES

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES: Psychology

PSY 150 Careers in Psychology—1 hour. Students will explore the variety of career options available to people with bachelors, masters, and doctoral degrees in psychology, with a focus on preparing their own career plan.

COLLEGE OF HEALTH AND HUMAN PERFORMANCE: Recreation and Sport Management

RCSM 425 Sport Sponsorship—3 hours. Students will develop a complete understanding of how sport properties can create effective commercial alliances with corporations through the creation and execution of sponsorship agreements. A major emphasis is given to understanding the theoretical reasons behind the effectiveness of sports sponsorships as communication vehicles. Student will also learn how to prepare sponsorship proposals, and critically evaluate their strategic implications.

COURSE REVISIONS

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES: Psychology

PSY 375 Statistics in Psychology—4 hours. This course focuses on statistics used in psychological research. Prerequisite: 201.

Change credit hours and prerequisites to:

PSY 375 Statistics in Psychology—3 hours. This course focuses on statistics used in psychological research. Prerequisites: 201, and Mathematics 111 or a higher-level mathematics course or appropriate Compass score.

PSY 376 Advanced Research Methods—3 hours. This course focuses on experimental research methods, with emphasis on the process of research, ranging from data collection to data analysis and writing of scientific reports. Prerequisite: 375.

Change title and description to:

PSY 376 Advanced Research and Writing--3 hours. This course focuses on research methods used in psychology with emphasis on the process of research, including study design, data collection and analysis, and writing of research reports. Prerequisite: 375.

PSY 384 Survey of Psychological Applications—3 hours. Students will be introduced to selected career alternatives in psychology, and several areas of psychological applications will be discussed. These will include, but are not limited to, clinical applications, organizational behavior, program evaluation, and various fields of human services. Prerequisites: 201 and junior standing, or consent of instructor.

Change title, description, and prerequisites to:

PSY 384 Interviewing Skills—3 hours. Students will learn listening and interviewing skills and how to implement these skills in a culturally sensitive manner in preparation for field placement and/or employment in a human services setting. Prerequisite: Junior standing or consent of instructor.

PSY 499T Honors Thesis—3-6 hours. Individual research for selected students who show high creative and productive promise in psychology. Prerequisites: senior standing and departmental invitation.

PSY 499T Honors Thesis—3-6 hours. Individual research for selected students who show high creative and productive promise in psychology. Repeatable to maximum 6 hours. Prerequisites: senior standing and departmental invitation.

PROGRAM REVISIONS

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES: Psychology

Psychology Major (37 semester hours)

Brief Summary:

Three changes are proposed. First, we are instituting a new 1-credit major requirement, PSY 150: Careers in Psychology. Second, we are reducing the credits associated with our statistics course, PSY 375, from 4 to 3 hours (and adding a mathematics prerequisite). Third, we are adding PSY 376, Advanced Research and Writing, back into our core requirements (and making it a prerequisite for our culminating experience courses). Together, these changes will result in increasing the credit hours of the psychology major from 37 to 40 hours.

Add PSY 150 - Careers in Psychology as a major requirement Reduce PSY 375 to 3 credit hours from 4 credit hours Add PSY 376 to core requirements

Student Learning. How have the results of student outcomes assessment and program or accreditation review been used on the proposed change? How will this change increase student learning and program effectiveness?

This modification is in response to several factors. First, the addition of the "Careers" course was suggested by our external program reviewers in Spring 2005. Second, the reduction in credit hours for PSY 375 will make our statistics course more consistent with those offered elsewhere (both on and off campus); the addition of the pre-requisite is motivated to keep students (who are no longer required to take the Quantitative Literacy course) from taking the course without adequate mathematical preparation. Finally, the re-addition of PSY 376 into the core requirements (which was dropped several years ago) is to a) improve students' writing skills before entering their culminating experience (and the workforce) and b) insure that all students have at least some "hands-on" training in psychological "science" (a need implied in one of the recommendations of our program reviewers).

- Required Psychology: 101--3 hrs.; 150--1 hr.; 201--3 hrs.; 375--3 hrs.; 376--3 hrs.; and at least 5 of the following core courses: 266, 270, 310, 342, 344, 356, 362, and 368--3 hrs. each. Required Mathematics: 111-3 hours. or higher, or appropriate Compass score.
- **Directed Electives** (9 semester hours): These courses may include any courses offered in the Department of Psychology.
- **Culminating Experience** (3 semester hours): Complete one of the following: 484--3 hrs., 486--3 hrs., or 499T--3 hrs.
